## Cultural Funding by Government—2020—21

## Australian Capital Territory Government

The estimate of expenditure funded by the Australian Capital Territory (ACT) Government in 2020–21 for cultural activities was **\$74.4m**, representing a decrease of 17% or \$15.0m from 2019–20. This amount includes **\$7.5m** of targeted COVID support funding for cultural and creative organisations and infrastructure, businesses, individuals, support programs and initiatives.

Recurrent expenses accounted for 88% (\$65.5m) of funded cultural expenditure.

Capital expenditure was \$8.9m, and the largest two categories were Libraries (\$4.0m) and Performing arts venues (\$2.4m).

The estimate of per person funding was \$172.76.

Funds for Total *Heritage* activities (recurrent and capital) remained steady ( $\uparrow 1\%$ ) at \$35.3m.

Increases in funding for the categories of *Other museums and cultural heritage* ( $\uparrow$ \$0.8m), and *Libraries* ( $\uparrow$ \$0.6m), were offset by a decrease for *Art museums* ( $\downarrow$ \$1.2m).

The largest categories of *Heritage* expenditure were *Libraries* with \$21.4, followed by *Other museums and cultural heritage* with \$8.1m. Expenditure on *Libraries* was over half (61%) the heritage expenditure by the ACT Government.<sup>4</sup>




Figure 1. ACT Government heritage expenditure

Funds for Total *Arts* activities (recurrent and capital) decreased 26% (or \$13.4m) to \$37.8m, mostly due to completion of capital works for *Performing arts venues* ( $\downarrow$ \$9.2m). Expenditure for *Community arts and cultural development* also dropped by \$1.8m.




Figure 2. ACT Government arts expenditure, by selected categories


Performing arts venues (\$17.0m) accounted for nearly half (45%) of total expenditure on Arts activities.

Other main categories of Arts activities funding were:

- Arts education—\$3.1m
- Visual arts and crafts—\$3.0m
- Community arts and cultural development—\$2.4m
- *Music*—\$2.3m.

Total recurrent expenditure dropped 10% (or \$7.5m) to \$65.5m.

The decrease was across several categories including *Community arts and cultural development* ( $\downarrow$  \$1.5m), offset by increases in *Music* and *Design* (both  $\uparrow$ \$0.5m).
