Cultural Funding by Government—2023–24

Australian Government

In 2023–24 the estimate of expenditure on cultural activities, funded by the Australian Government, was **\$3,113.6m** representing a decrease of 2% or \$51.6m from 2021–22.

The estimate of per person cultural funding was \$115.54.

Heritage

Funds for Total Heritage activities (recurrent and capital) decreased 6% (or \$53.1m) to \$873.9m.

Expenditure increased in the categories of *Art museums* \uparrow \$5.3m, *Libraries* \uparrow \$25.9m, and *Archives* \uparrow \$5.7m. Funds for *Other museums and cultural heritage* decreased by \$90.0m, or 17%.

The two largest categories of *Heritage* expenditure were *Other museums and cultural heritage* (\$438.9m) and *Archives* (\$156.2m).




Figure 1. Australian Government heritage expenditure (recurrent and capital)

Arts

The Australian Government allocated 72% of the total funded cultural expenditure to *Arts* activities and 28% to *Heritage* activities.

Funds for Total Arts activities (recurrent and capital) increased less than 1% (or \$6.0m) to \$2,239.7m.

The largest increases in expenditure were for *Radio and television services* (\uparrow \$158.2m), *Arts administration* (\uparrow \$20.6m) and *Other arts* (\uparrow \$14.6m). These increases were offset by decreases in the categories of *Music theatre and opera* (\downarrow \$46.0m), *Film and video production and distribution* (\downarrow \$35.4m) and *Music* (\downarrow \$30.1m).

The main categories of Arts funding were:

- Radio and television services —\$1,598.3m
- Film and video production and distribution—\$149.8m
- Music—\$128.3m
- Arts administration—\$72.3m
- Visual arts and crafts—\$55.2m
- Literature and writing—\$45.1m
- Other arts—\$43.5m

Recurrent expenditure


Total heritage and arts recurrent expenditure increased by 1% (or \$35.7m) to \$2,768.5m and accounted for 89% of total funded cultural expenditure.

The highest recurrent expenditure was for *Radio and television services* (\$1,455.8m), followed by *Other museums and cultural heritage* (\$359.8m).

Other main categories of recurrent expenditure were:

- Film and video production and distribution—\$149.8m
- *Archives*—\$132.9m
- Music—\$124.0m
- *Libraries*—\$99.1m
- Art museums—\$89.5m
- Arts administration—\$72.3m

Capital expenditure

Total heritage and arts capital expenditure decreased by 20% (or \$87.3m) to \$345.1m in 2023–24 and accounted for 11% of Australian Government cultural spending.

The decline was driven by a reduction in the 'Other museums and cultural heritage' category, which fell from \$212.3 million in 2021-22 to \$79.1 million in 2023-24, a decrease of 62.7%.

The capital expenditure figure was impacted by the timing of funding allocations for the multi-year Australian War Memorial Redevelopment Project.

The highest capital expenditure was for *Radio and television services* (\$142.5m), followed by *Other museums and cultural heritage* (\$79.1m).

Other main categories of capital investment were:

- Art museums—\$57.6m
- Libraries—\$32.7m
- Archives—\$23.4m
