Cultural Funding by Government—2023–24

Oueensland Government

The estimate of expenditure funded by the Queensland Government in 2023–24 for cultural activities was **\$582.1m**. This represented an increase of 12% or \$64.0m from 2021–22.


- Recurrent expenses accounted for 81% (\$469.1m) of funded cultural expenditure.
- Capital expenditure was \$113.0m, and the largest categories were *Performing arts venues* (\$77.2m) and *Libraries* (\$16.6m).
- The estimate of per person cultural funding was \$105.33.

Funds for Total *Heritage* activities (recurrent and capital) rose 13% (or \$30.4m) to \$268.7m.

This increase was driven by a rise in all *Heritage* categories of expenditure. However, the main contributor was *Libraries* with an increase of \$22.2m, followed by *Art museums* (\$4.3m).

The largest categories of *Heritage* expenditure were *Libraries* \$106.3m, followed by *Other museums and cultural heritage* with \$81.3m.

Funds for Total Arts activities (recurrent and capital) rose 12% (or \$33.6m) to \$313.4m.

This shift was mainly driven by an increase in *Film and video production and distribution*, $\uparrow $31.7m$, as well as *Arts education* ($\uparrow $4.5m$), *Cross-art form* ($\uparrow $3.6m$), and *Community arts and cultural development* ($\uparrow 3.4m$).




Figure 2. Queensland Government arts expenditure, by selected categories (recurrent and capital)

Performing arts venues (\$122.2m) accounted for over one-third (or 39%) of all funded expenditure by the Queensland Government on *Arts* activities.

Other main categories of Arts activities funding were:

- Arts education—\$52.3m
- Film and video production and distribution—\$42.9m
- Music—\$20.8m
- Community arts and cultural development—\$11.8m

Total heritage and arts **recurrent** expenditure increased by 17% (or \$66.8m) to \$469.1m.

The largest recurrent expenditure was for *Libraries*, \$89.7m, followed by *Other museums and cultural heritage* (\$67.2m) and *Art museums* (\$61.6m).
