

Dear Minister

I am pleased to submit this report in accordance with Section 19 of the Public Lending Right Act 1985. The report covers the 2024–25 financial year and is the 38th annual report of the Public Lending Right Committee.

From its commencement in 1974 to present, the Public Lending Right (PLR) has recompensed eligible Australian creators and publishers for their books being available in public lending libraries and supported the enrichment of Australian culture by encouraging the creation and publication of Australian books.

The Committee is also pleased to assist with, and advise on, the Educational Lending Right (ELR) scheme, a complementary administrative program introduced in 2000–01 that provides Australian creators and publishers recompense for works available in educational libraries.

The Committee is aware that PLR and ELR payments represent stable income to authors in an otherwise financially precarious career, and we are proud of its direct impact. The distribution of \$14,785,462 in PLR payments to 7,044 individual eligible Australian creators and publishers, together with the distribution of \$13,374,423 in ELR payments to 10,566 individual eligible creators and publishers, has assisted significantly in supporting creators and publishers. Payments for both schemes were made in June 2025.

On behalf of the Committee I would like to thank the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development, Communications, Sport and the Arts for its smooth administration of the schemes, including its ongoing efforts to continuously improve data collection on digital formats. I also warmly acknowledge the essential contribution of libraries that assist in the annual surveys.

Public Lending Right scheme

Public Lending Right (PLR) is a scheme established by the Australian Government in 1974 to make payments to eligible creators and publishers for the potential loss of sales from the availability of their books in public lending libraries.

The scheme aims to enrich Australian culture by encouraging the growth and development of Australian writing and publishing.

The *Public Lending Right Act 1985* (the Act) provides that the Minister may 'approve or modify a scheme for and in relation to the making of payments to persons in respect of books'. The *Public Lending Right Scheme 2016* provides the basis for the administration of the scheme. The PLR Committee is appointed under the Act by the Minister for the Arts to administer the PLR scheme.

Under Revive, the National Cultural Policy released in 2023, the eligibility for lending rights was expanded to include e-books and audiobooks from 2023–24.

Administration of the scheme

While the PLR Committee administers the scheme, its day-to-day operation is undertaken by staff in the Creative Industries Branch in the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development, Communications, Sport and the Arts (the department), under delegation from the Committee.

The Committee wishes to record its appreciation for the support provided by the department.

How the scheme operates

Australian creators and publishers are invited to submit claims for their books to the department. PLR payments to eligible creators and publishers are determined by the number of copies of their books estimated to be held in public lending libraries in Australia.

This information is extrapolated from an annual survey of the books held in a sample of public lending libraries. If the survey results indicate that 50 or more copies of an eligible book are held in public libraries across Australia, a payment may be made.

Books are surveyed annually for two consecutive financial years following the year of publication. If, following the second year, a book is still held in sufficient numbers in public lending libraries, it will be re-surveyed every three years. Books scoring less than 50 copies in the second year or for two subsequent surveys are removed from the survey cycle.

The following eligibility criteria apply to the PLR scheme:

- Eligible creators must be Australian citizens (living in Australia or overseas) or permanent residents of Australia.
- Eligible creators (maximum of five per book) may include authors, editors, illustrators, translators or compilers.
- Eligible publishers may include publishers whose business consists wholly or substantially of the publication of books and who regularly publish in Australia (i.e. at least one new book or revised edition in the preceding three-year period); self-publishing creators; and non-profit organisations that publish to further their aims and objectives.

For books surveyed in 2024–25 approximately 80.7% were print format, 14.9% were e-book format, and 4.4% were audiobook format.

New claimants

During 2024–25, 829 new claimants registered for the program. Table 1 lists the number of new claimants registered in each of the last five program years.

New claims registered

Table 2 lists the number of new claims registered in each of the last five program years. The number of new claims registered for the 2024–25 program was 32,572. This is consistent with the increase in claims since e-books and audiobooks became eligible for the PLR scheme in 2023–24.

Library survey

A statistical consultant engaged by the department has designed sampling and survey procedures for the collection of data on public library book stocks and the subsequent estimation of copies held for payment purposes.

In 2023–24 PLR expanded to include e-books and audiobooks which are available through libraries under various licencing arrangements. The types of licences and loan data for digital books were considered in converting digital holdings into equivalent book copies. This approach was validated by statisticians engaged by the department and will be further developed over time to continue to improve accuracy.

In 2024–25, 36 Australian public library networks were selected to participate in the PLR survey, representing a total book stock of over 15.9 million. The networks included catalogues of public libraries administered by six state governments, many large regional library networks, and a small number of individual libraries. These represent 48% of the total book stock of Australian public libraries.

Payments

In March 2025 the Hon Tony Burke MP, Minister for the Arts, approved the PLR payment rates for 2024–25. Tiered payment rates were introduced into the PLR scheme in 2023–24. Tiered payment rates have been used in the Educational Lending Right (ELR) scheme since its inception in 2000–01.

PLR payments totalling \$14.785 million for 2024–25 were made to 7,044 claimants of which 6,825 were creators and 219 were publishers.

Program expenses

- production and distribution of payment advice letters.

Other operational costs, including salaries of departmental officers, were met from departmental funds.

Freedom of information

During the 2024–25 financial year no requests were received pursuant to the Freedom of Information Act 1982.

Educational Lending Right

Educational Lending Right (ELR) is an Australian Government cultural program introduced in 2000–01 and administered by the department. The eligibility criteria applying to the PLR scheme also apply to the ELR scheme. Full details on ELR are in the *Educational Lending Right Policies and Procedures 2023*, available from arts.gov.au/funding-and-support/lending-rights.

In 2023–24 the ELR scheme expanded to include e-books and audiobooks.

In the 2024–25 financial year the ELR scheme made payments totalling \$13.378 million to 10,571 claimants of whom 10,160 were creators and 411 were publishers whose books are held in educational libraries, including school, Technical and Further Education (TAFE) and university libraries.

Lending Rights Online

The Lending Rights Online service provides claimants with convenient access at any time to:

- register as creators or publishers,
- submit title claims for books,
- update their contact and banking details, and
- view their payment history.

Over 94 per cent of claims were lodged via Lending Rights Online during the 2024–25 program year.



PLR and ELR payments to eligible creators and publishers are determined by the estimated number of copies of their books held in lending libraries in Australia.

In 2024–25 over 17,000 payments totalling \$28.16 million were made.
